

head Mask — allows us to breath the supplied air and not the smoke and other nasty by products (protects our airway)

Helmet - Protection

from falling objects and protecting the overall

Turnout Coat – made up of 3 layers (outer shell, moisture barrier and thermal barrier). Heat resistant up to certain temperatures and doesn't allow moisture in or out.

> Gloves – protection for picking up hot objects, crawling around on the floor alor with handling some tools.

Turnout Pant - made up of 3 layers (outer shell, moisture barrier and thermal barrier). Heat resistant up to certain temperatures and doesn't allow moisture in or out.

> Boots — Steel toed boots to protect from falling or sharp objects along with water

Hood - protection of lower part of the head, neck and face

> SCBA (Self Contained Breathing Apparatus) – In other words, our air supply.






Fire Protection and Emergency Response Services Assessment by the County of Santa Cruz, County Service Area 48



The Santa Cruz County Fire Department is 65-70 Volunteer firefighters located at:

- South Skyline (Company 29)
- Loma Prieta (Company 36)
- Bonny Doon (Company 32)
- Corralitos (Company 41)
- Davenport

(Company 41) (Company 37)

Each of these Volunteer Companies works with a corresponding CAL FIRE station. Together we cover almost 300 square miles of the rural Santa Cruz county, formally called *County Service Area 48* (CSA 48).

We train and respond with CAL FIRE to all types of emergency, fire and medical incidents in rural Santa Cruz County. We are operationally integrated into CAL FIRE. Our mission is to protect life, property and environment. Many of our volunteers go on to become career firefighters.

Unlike CAL FIRE, our funding comes only from a fixed percentage of local property taxes and the CSA 48 fee shown on the property tax bills. These critical funds pay for all of our fire engines, rescue vehicles, and personal protective gear, as well as our training and administrative support provided by CAL FIRE.

These funds also ensure continuous staffing at CAL FIRE stations in each of our five areas during the winter (non-fire) season.

In 2018, Santa Cruz County Fire Volunteers responded to over 2200 incidents.
